Entrance to this, the one "extra-fare" meet of the year, will be \$6.00 for current Division members, \$7.00 for non-members, and \$4.00 for those under 12.

Fine-Tuning Rolling Stock for Optimum Performance

There are several areas to consider when attempting to assemble rolling stock for trouble-free operation:

WEIGHT

There are three options for the weighting of rolling stock: the removal of all weight, the use of the weights supplied (this is the least desirable option because there is so much variation), or the use of the NMRA recommended weight - 1 oz. of weight plus ½ oz. per inch of car length (for HO). [For other scales, see the NMRA's RP 20.1 -Ed.] Thus, an HO 40-foot car should weigh 3¾ oz.

You can use a postal or diet scale for measuring weight. These may need to be calibrated. As a reference, 4 oz. equals 412 grams.

For house cars, you can glue weight to the top of the floor with contact cement or silicon seal. Try fishing sinkers, drapery weights, auto wheel balancing weights, old (or new) nuts and bolts, or printers' slugs.

Weighting hoppers is more difficult. Homemade or commercial loads provide some weight themselves and easily disguise other weights. For empty cars, glue lead shot into the hopper bays, then paint. Keil-Line Models produces a line of weights that pop right in.

Covered hoppers can also be weighted with lead shot glued into the bays; open cars with 1/8" solid core solder flattened out and glued in the center sill, pieces of slugs glued to the bottom, or with loads.

COUPLERS

Check the height with a Kadee

gauge on a piece of track with a rerailer. To adjust them, use Kadee fiber washers, metal flat washers, or 36" wheelsets on modern cars.

TRUCKS

Check wheelset gauge three times around the circumference with a NMRA gauge. Check to make sure that the wheelsets are centered in the sideframes. When installing the trucks, make sure that one swivels only and one swivels and rocks a little. On cars with Athearn-style truck pivots, be sure to set the coupler height firstwashers affect the amount to be filed off the shoulder.

For snap-in kingpin trucks, drill out the hole in the bolster to 1/6" and glue in a piece of Plastruct tubing. Let a little of the tubing stick up above the bolster similar to Athearn's shoulder. Be sure to use Plastruct cement. When dry, drill a #50 hole and tap 2-56.

If the hole in the bolster is larger than V_8 ", drill it out to V_{18} ", glue in V_{18} " Plastruct tubing and let dry throroughly. Drill out the center of the V_{18} " tube to V_{18} " and proceed as above.

ROLLING ABILITY

Rolling stock should roll down a certain grade without a push. Use a 3% grade (a ¾" block under a 25" length of track). If the car doesn't roll, remove the wheelsets and polish the axle points with a wire wheel in a motor tool. Clean the dirt out of the journals with alcohol and a pipe cleaner. Lubricate it with powdered graphite -not oil. If this doesn't work, trash the trucks.

On Saturday, March 19, the Philadelphia Division conducted a meet at the St. Alban's Church in Newtown Square. Division members braved the foul weather to attend. Almost ten tables of merchandise were available for purchase.

March Meet Report

First, Tom Tanner discussed a Simple, Inexpensive Copy Stand, which could be used in making slides of models and printed media. Next, Dave Messer, MMR, the Division Achievement Program Chairman, continued his series on the NIMBA Achievement Program. Paul Backenstose presented Fine-Tuning Rolling Stock for Optimum Performance.

Chuck Denlinger then discussed Building the N-Scale Broad Street Station. His incredible model, depicting the station as it appeared in 1893, was on display.

Finally, John Nawn conducted a slide presentation on the New Hope & Ivyland Railroad, a preview of what we'll see at the June meet.

There were four entries in the MOW/Non-Revenue Equipment popular vote contest. The winner was John Nawn's model of a 25-ton crane.

Door prizes were donated by Brandywine Hobbies and Tom Saxton. Thank youl

After the meet, a group of over ten interested members met to discuss the possibility of setting up a Division HO modular group. See page 1 for more information.

During the afternoon, four HO scale layouts were open: the St. Alban's Model Railroad Club's Saint Alban's Railroad, Bill Blackburn's PRR, Great Valley Division, Jim Dalberg's New Jersey Northern, and Chris Yocum's Springfield & Eastern.
