Division Meet and Family Day: May 18 on the Brandywine Scenic Railroad

The Philadelphia Division is pleased to announce its annual Family Day outing on Saturday, May 18, 1996. This year, we will be taking a trip on the new Brandywine Scenic Railroad, operating out of Northbrook on the new Delaware Valley Railroad Co. (formerly Octararo Railroad) trackage. For a preview, the Brandywine Scenic is featured in the April issue of *Railpace*.

The meet will start at 10:00 a.m. with a brief Division meeting to update members on the current activities of the Division and the plans for the Brandywine Junction '97 MER Convention.

This will be followed by presentations by Dave Hope, president of Brandywine Scenic, and Don Richards, manager of operations and maintenance of the Delaware Valley Railroad Company. These gentlemen will give us insight into the operation of both a tourist railroad and a modern shortline with a time for questions following their presentations. Our rail trip will depart at 11 a.m., pro-

ceeding south towards Chadds Ford, and will last about one hour. Power for this trip should be RS32 #211. There will be a special door prize of a cab ride.

Fares for Division members and spouses will be \$5; for guests, \$7 (including a one-year membership); for children under 12, \$4. The regular fares

are \$8 for adults and \$6 for children.

We encourage you to bring the family and enjoy a day of railroading with us on the Brandywine Scenic. There is a picnic grove available at the Northbrook station, and there will be layout tours in the afternoon. We hope to see you all there on the 18th!

Meet Me at the Junction

Our continuing series keeping the membership up to date on the planning and events leading up to Brandywine Junction '97, the Mid-Eastern Region Fall Convention, November 7-9, 1997, hosted by the Philadelphia Division.

Since our last report, we had the opportunity to meet officials from both the Brandywine Scenic Railroad and the Delaware Valley Railroad and presented them with our proposed fan trip/railfan events for the Convention. While we have not received official concurrence or pricing on these events, there seemed to be general agreement that our requests were do-able. We anticipate the

following railfan events:

- A Friday afternoon mixed train on the former Wilmington and Northern possibly utilizing the Reading F-units.
- A Friday evening photo session with the F-units and the Pennsy Doodlebug at Chadds Ford Junction.
- Saturday fan trip(s) on the Octararo Branch using the Pennsy Doodlebug.
- Special pricing on the regular BSRR trips along the W&N on Saturday.

We are also awaiting a proposal from Walthers on production of our Convention Car, a Pennsy K-7 stock car.

Finally, we have extended the deadline for the "Brandywine Club" to July 1, or the first 100 members. If you haven't sent in your membership yet, and want to save a few bucks on the Convention, you still have time.

Next issue will have updated information on the prototype tours.

Model Railroad Planning 1996

Kalmbach Publishing has made model railroading history once again. The second section of Model Railroad Planning, the 1996 edition, is arguably even better than the debut issue, reviewed in the May 1995 Dispatcher. I roared through MRP cover-to-cover, and I'm eagerly awaiting MRP 1997.

The evolution of Sunrise Yard on editor Tony Koester's Allegheny Midland is the cover story. It thoughtfully discusses operational considerations which affect freight yard design. Don Daily details the aroundthe-clock switching at the Nickel Plate's Frankfort, Ind. freight hub.

David Barrow, Allen McClelland, and

Michael Tylick were invited to try to shrink their famous layouts down to spare bedroom-size. Their efforts reveal much about priorities in planning.

Paul Dolkos discusses British tricks and techniques, notably the invaluable fiddle yard, in "No Space is No Excuse."

Doug Gurin presents a plan for modeling two competing railroads, the O&LD Rv. and the NEW RR.

Mike Dodd takes you step-by-step through the layout design process using Cadrail, including its advanced features.

All this and more is available on your dealer's shelf until May 31. MRP has established itself as the forum for layout planners to share ideas.

On Saturday, March 23, 1996, the Philadelphia Division conducted at meet at the St. Alban's Church in Newtown Square. Eighty-two members plus seven future members packed the room.

The clinic program began with "Being a Locomotive Engineer," by Lee Schultz. He told the audience to forget the glory; "it's not that way anymore." The "real work" begins each day with an inspection of the locomotive. Lee presented slides of some of his favorite engines, including a GG1. The longest train he ever hauled had 222 cars and was pulled from Enola to Baltimore by two E44's. Unfortunately, we ran out of time before Lee could show us a training video, so he's planning to come back.

Next, Bill Gruber and Ron Gaines, staff members of the Jersev Limited '96 Fall MER Convention discussed the program, to be held on October 3-6 in Mt. Laurel NJ. It will include 35 home layouts and a layout lottery, an interlocking tower contest, and much more.


Steve Salotti discussed his procedure for "Easy Control Panel Labeling," involving Avery laser labels and chart tape. The basic idea is to coat the labels with clear spray after affixing them to the panel.

Eric Dervinis wore a nametag stating "I am not Bob Charles." Bob, NMRA President, postponed his visit to our Division after being called away on urgent national business. Eric, National Assistant Secretary, filled in and answered questions about the NMRA.

Jim Eisenhart, a Conrail conductor, gave a presentation on "Modeling West Falls, Falls Grade, and Midvale," filled with prototype photos.

Steve Salotti's Lightcap Publishing industrial model won the popular vote contest. Steve and other lucky attendees chose from door prizes including a gift certificate and a Bachmann Spectrum Wide Cab from Ardmore Hobbies.

During the afternoon, the St. Alban's Railroad and Module Team was as well as the home layouts of Win Gross, Jim Hart, Terry Smith, and Jim Pond. Many thanks to our layout hosts.



Directions to Northbrook

All trains depart from the Northbrook Canoe Company located on Northbrook Road, six miles west of downtown West Chester in the heart of Chester County.

From West Chester: From High Street (Business 322) take Route 842 West (Miner Street). Follow Route 842 West for approximately six miles to Northbrook Road (Northbrook Orchards Country Store is on the corner). Turn right on Northbrook Road for about sixtenths of a mile to the railroad crossing at the Northbrook Canoe Company.

From Wilmington: Follow Route 202 North to West Chester and go straight into downtown West Chester on High Street (Business Route 322). Do not take the Route 202 bypass. Then

follow the West Chester directions above.

You may also follow Route 52 (Kennett Pike) North to U.S. Route 1. Turn left (south) on Route 1 towards Longwood Gardens. Then follow the U.S. Route 1 directions below.

From U.S. Route 1: Take the Route 82 North exit (near Kennett Square) and follow Route 82 North for approximately three miles to Route 842 East (towards West Chester) in Union-ville. Follow Route 842 East for approximately three miles to Northbrook Road (Northbrook Orchards Country Store is on the corner). Turn left on Northbrook Road for approximately sixtenths of a mile to the railroad crossing at the Northbrook Canoe Company.

From Interstate 95: If traveling south on I-95 from areas north of the Philadelphia International Airport, take the Route 322 West exit and follow Route 322 to West Chester. Remain on Business Route 322 into downtown West Chester which will put you on High Street. Then follow the West Chester directions above.

If traveling north on I-95 from south of the Wilmington area, take the Route 202 North exit and follow the Wilmington directions above.

From New Jersey: From southern New Jersey, cross the Delaware Memorial Bridge and take Interstate 95 north to Wilmington. Take the Route 202 North exit and follow the Wilmington directions above.


