available to go to neighboring divisions and local train clubs.

We have completed a working budget and will begin accepting early reservations at Mt. Laurel. In as much as some of the tours have not yet been finalized, all those using the early reservation form will get first choice of tours.

The Brandywine Club is closed except for those signing up at the staff rate. We currently have 17 Brandywine Club members. Staff will be able to sign up at the staff rate right up until the convention.

Just a reminder to all Division members: as this is a Region event and we are just the hosts, this is *not* a free event for Division members. All Division members who wish to participate in the convention will have to sign up as either a staff member or at the regular rate(s). If you are not a member of the Region or National, there is an additional surcharge. So please don't get left at the station; the earlier you sign up the better opportunity you have of getting on the tours.

The layout tour team is well on their way at the present time. We have approached Lukens Steel about a tour of their facilities and they are quite receptive. However, they will not schedule anything until January. We have, however, confirmed the tour of SEPTA's Frazer Maintenance Shops, responsible for the maintenance of the MU and pushpull equipment. All operations at Paoli have been transferred to Frazer. This will be a Friday afternoon tour, probably about 2:00 p.m. In the clinic department, Bob Charles, our National president, has agreed to join us for the convention. Our off-line (non-rail) group has been quite busy and has a proposal for a full-day bus tour of various family-related sites throughout the Brandywine Valley including Longwood and the Brandywine River Museum.

Early reservation forms will also be available at our November meet, so sign up and don't miss the train. See you in October.

# Classic Trains

The half century ending with the splitting of the atom was the age of classic trains. In a time when the only way to travel was by rail, the railroads responded with a multitude of name trains.

The longest continuously running train may well have been New Haven-Pennsylvania's Boston to Washington train. Launched in 1876, because of the Philadelphia Centennial Exposition, the Washington Night Express bypassed New York City. In 1892, the name was changed to the Federal Express, and in 1913, to the Federal, when it took a direct course through Pennsylvania Station in New York City. It was the Federal that won notoriety in 1952 as a runaway, when it crashed into Washington Union Terminal only days before the inauguration of President Eisenhower.

The Pennsylvania Railroad holds the distinction of creating the first extra-fare train. First called the *New York-Chicago Limited*, it was rechristened (1891) as the *Pennsylvania Limited*. Not to be outdone, the New York Central launched its *Chicago Limited*, and in 1902, created the *Twentieth Century Limited*. Ten years later the Pennsylvania challenged the *Century* with the *Broadway Limited*.

Just before the turn of the century the naming of trains became the trend. Lehigh Valley's *Black Diamond Express*, Baltimore and Ohio's *Royal Blue Flyer*, Pennsy's *Congressional Limited*, Union Pacific's *Overland Limited*, and Southern Pacific's *Sunset Limited*.

Contrary to popular belief, the word "limited" added to a train's name did not mean it made only a limited number of stops. The passenger paid an extra fare to arrive at a time scheduled by the railroad. If the railroad didn't deliver on time, then a portion of the passenger's fare was refunded. The custom ended long ago, but the name has remained on trains into the Amtrak era.

The naming of passenger trains was

done by the marketing and public relations departments of the railroads. Trains carried a variety of names.

The Pennsy and B&O were noted for trains named after government process. The Pennsy operated The Congressional, The Constitution, The Executive, The President, The Governor (Philadelphia to Harrisburg), The Federal, the Judiciary, The Embassy, The Legislator, The Senator, and The Washingtonian. The B&O also had a Washingtonian, along with The Ambassador, Capitol Limited, Diplomat, and National Limited.

Classic trains named after famous personages included Chesapeake and Ohio's George Washington, New York Central-Boston and Maine's Paul Revere. Gulf Mobile and Ohio's (later Illinois Central Gulf) Abraham Lincoln, Pennsylvania's William Penn and Nellie Bly (the famous globetrotter). There was also Southern's Ponce de Leon, Frisco's Will Rogers, Chicago Burlington & Quincy's (now part of Burlington Northern) Mark Twain and Sam Houston, New York Central's mile-a-minute daylight speedster John Witcomb Riley, and Lehigh Valley's John Wilkes (after the founder of Wilkes-Barre).

The Native American nations were well represented by name trains. The most famous were Milwaukee Road's Hiawatha (that extended into the Amtrak era), followed by Norfolk and Western's Pocohontas and Powhaten (pronounced Pow-a-tan). Other trains were Missouri Pacific's Aztec Eagle that operated into Mexico and the Rock Island's Cherokee Imperial to Los Angeles. Still other famous trains were Milwaukee's Sioux, Atlantic Coast Line-George Central-Florida East Coast's Seminole, and the New York Central's Iroquois.

Passenger trains were also citizens of many places. There were the famed streamliner City Trains – City of: Den-

ver, Kansas City, Los Angeles, Miami, Milwaukee, New Orleans, Portland, St. Louis, and San Francisco. The Santa Fe traversed the historic and scenic southwest, and named its premier trains Chief, Super Chief, Grand Canyon, Golden Gate, El Capitan, and Scout. Great Northern operated the Cascade and Rio Grande the Prospector.

The railroads were quick to realize the graceful lines of a bird in flight invoked thoughts of beauty and speed. Names of the most popular were Wabash's *Blue Bird*, Louisville and Nashville's *Hummingbird*, Southern Pacific's *Lark*, and Missouri Pacific's *Eagle*.

The traveling public often gave less glamorous names to trains. My favorite was a day train operated by the Illinois Central between Kentucky and the Ohio River city of Cairo, Illinois. Because many portions of Kentucky are dry, the western part being no exception, the IC train carried Kentucky citizens into Illinois with the sole intent of replenishing their liquor stocks. The local public nicknamed the train the Whiskey Dick, after author Bret Harte's fictional comical drunkard. The local passenger train passed away years ago, but the name remained, transferred to a freight train that runs out of Louisville hauling the vast quantities of bourbon produced there.

Those interested in reading and viewing photographs of the classic trains overland travelers chose will find two excellent reference books: *Some Classic Trains* (434 p.) and *More Classic Trains* (512 p.), both by Arthur D. Dubin, and published by Kalmbach.

Those interested in creating classic trains, in miniature, will find a visit to your favorite hobby shops and browsing though a Walthers catalog beneficial. Regardless of the scale in which you model, a wealth of locomotive equipment and rolling stock is available at modest prices.

# The Philadelphia Division continues to grow and build on our strong performance over the past four years. We currently have close to 400 [now over 420 – Ed.] members on our roster, which is almost a 65% increase over membership from the previous year. Membership appears to be growing at about 60% per year.

Division officers remain with John Nawn and Steve Salotti serving in the positions of superintendent and assistant superintendent, respectively. Mike Hazzard serves as treasurer and Eric Dervinis as chief clerk. Dave Messer, MMR, remains as the AP coordinator, and Nathan Ashby-Kuhlman as the editor of the *Philadelphia Dispatcher*, our quarterly publication.

The Division continued its quarterly meet schedule for the past year. Our first annual train show and sale held in September was a complete success with over 90 dealer tables, four clinics, door prizes every half hour, three operating layouts representing HO, O, and N scales, a "Kidz Corner" with crafts and stories for the kids and over 1000 members of the general public in attendance.

Following this highly successful meet, we held our November meet in Fairview Village. This was our fourth year at this location. The meet had a slight "steel" bent to it with many excellent clinics including one on the steel industry and one on coal mining. Region vice-president, John Johnson, was in attendance.

1996 kicked off with a very wellattended March meet in Newtown Square (our third year at this location). Approximately 80 members attended. Members were treated to some excellent clinics, layout tours, and the on-site St. Alban's Railroad layout and HO modules.

In May, our family meet was held on the Brandywine Scenic Railroad, with many members in attendance to ride this new tourist line behind Alco diesels. The day concluded again with layout tours.

Plans are currently being finalized for the Division's September meet, our second annual train show and sale again

featuring dealer tables, door prizes, clinics, the Kidz Corner, and five operating layouts including one N scale modular railroad, two HO scale modular railroads, an On3 modular railroad and an HO scale trolley layout that can be operated by the general public.

The Division will also be hosting the train show at Jersey Limited '96, the MER fall convention. All Division members not otherwise attending the convention will be admitted to the train show for free. As of this date, both of our fall shows are sold out. We will again close 1996 with a meet at Fairview Village, including a visit from the national president, Mr. Bob Charles. Plans are also being investigated for a 1997 joint meet between the New Jersey and Philadelphia divisions.

The plans for Brandywine Junction '97, the MER fall convention, hosted by the Division, are progressing nicely. As of this writing, at least two fan trips are in the process of being finalized on the Brandywine Scenic Railroad, including the Pennsy Doodlebug and trips behind the Reading F7's; Dean Freytag has agreed to join us as a clinician; prototype tours are being finalized, including a trip through Lukens Steel and SEPTA's Frazer maintenance shops, among others.

In addition, the Eastern Region N-Trak convention will be held on the same weekend in the same general vicinity and discussions are ongoing to allow attendees at each convention to attend events at both with a free shuttle service provided. The Division will be making a major promotional pitch at the Mt. Laurel convention and is producting a promotional slide show for Mt. Laurel and Asheville.

Under the direction of Mr. Bob Browne, the Division HO Module Team has been very active and continues to grow. In addition to appearing at the Division's September show, the team also set up at a November and December Greenberg's show. In January, the Module Team took second place at the Great American Train Show's first-ever Phila-

delphia show. The Division was also a co-sponsor of the show. In March, the team was one of three layouts invited to the East Coast Hobby Show, with the Module Team's layout measuring over 100 feet long.

The Division continued the hobby shop discount program with seven local hobby shops [now eight – *Ed.*] now participating.

Division dues remain at \$3.00 per year which includes a quarterly newsletter, free entrance to Division meets, discounts at local hobby shops, and participation in the HO modular railroad program, among other benefits. The Division treasury remains in the black with a balance in excess of \$4,000 at the current time.

In light of the recent interpretations of the NMRA insurance policy and vote by the Region trustees at the annual meeting, the Division expects to incorporate by the end of the year and purchase our own insurance policy through an outside vendor.

Our promotional efforts this year included mailing our September newsletter to all Region and National members within the Division, and a discount on Division membership for all those new members who signed up at our September train show. This show is accompanied by a major local promotional campaign.

In order to promote Regional membership, we are currently offering a discount on Division dues if members join the Region or renew their Region membership through the Division. The Division may implement a similar discount program for National dues in the near future to help bolster National membership.

The Division looks forward to an exciting 1997, which is expected to include our traditional March meet, a joint meet with our neighboring Division to the east, another successful train show, and culminating with the Region convention.


