

He holds the Achievement Certificate for Association Volunteer, and is currently working on the Chief Dispatcher Certificate.

Tim is the Convention Chairman for the upcoming Keystone Junction 2001, and is the current Clerk for the Philadelphia Division.

Assistant Superintendent: John A. Nawn,

John, an NMRA member since 1980, currently resides in Sharon Hill, Delaware County, with his wife and two children. Many may remember John as our past Division Superintendent, where he served in the post from 1992 until 1998. Prior to that, John was a Region Department Chairman and on the staff of the 1993 National Convention. John was also the Chairman of the 1997, Brandywine Junction Region Convention, and was on the staffs of the 1996 Jersey Limited, 1998 Lehigh Valley Limited and is currently the Clerk for the 2001 Keystone Junction Region Convention. John also currently serves the NMRA as the National Chairman of the Conformance & Inspection Committee, the group that issues the NMRA warrants.

John models mainly in HO scale, but dabbles in almost all scales. John reports that no layout is currently under construction since he is still regrouping from a late 1998 move, but the 1000 square foot basement is sure to be filled with a layout in the next few years. John and the family are also planning the construction of an outdoor large-scale garden railroad this summer and he is currently working on an 0/0n30" modular railroad with his brother. John was a charter member of the Board of Directors of the now defunct Delaware Valley HO-Trak modular group and is a member of the East Penn Traction Club. John currently holds achievement certificates in Author and Volunteer.

When not working on trains, John is heavily involved as a volunteer with the Boy Scouts. John is also a member of the Board of Directors of the Sharon Hill Historical Society, which is restoring the 1872 Sharon Hill Railroad Station on the Northeast Corridor. Professionally, John, a licensed Professional Engineer is Director of Transportation Engineering for a private engineering consulting firm in Devon. One of John's current projects is the design and construction management of the new Paradise Train Station on Amtrak's Harrisburg line.
