Concrete

Concrete:

- 1. Constituting an actual thing or instance; real: *a concrete proof of his sincerity*.
- 2. Pertaining to or concerned with realities or actual instances rather than abstractions; particular (opposed to <u>GENERAL</u>): *concrete ideas*.
- 3. Representing or applied to an actual substance or thing, as opposed to an abstract quality: *The words* "cat," "water," and "teacher" are concrete, whereas the words "truth," "excellence," and "adulthood" are abstract.
- 4. A concrete idea or term; a word or notion having an actual or existent thing or instance as its referent.
- 5. A mass formed by coalescence or concretion of particles of matter.
- 6. An artificial, stone like material used for various structural purposes, made by mixing cement and various aggregates, as sand, pebbles, gravel, or shale, with water and allowing the mixture to harden.
- 7. Some people's minds are like concrete, all mixed up and permanently set.

OK, now to the real purpose of this article.

As we build our model railroads one frequently discussed theme seems to be "what is the best color to simulate concrete". I know I have had that discussion on several occasions, and have tried a number of different color combinations to get the "perfect" look. To my eye Floquil concrete just doesn't look right. There seems to be too much gray in it, looking more like just poured concrete that hasn't set yet. I have also tried using it mixed with other colors like Reefer White or Antique White. While these are good, they still just don't satisfy my eyes.

One color I like is Poly Scale concrete mixed about 50/50 with either Reefer or Antique White color. The problem I have with this is trying to spray the stuff. No matter what I've tried, the Poly Scale paint seems to dry in the air gun, especially during long spray jobs. While it does work, cleanup can be a lot of work.

A recent thread on the Buildings and Structures group I belong to covered this topic, and a number of different techniques were posted. Are any of you familiar with any of these, or do you have a technique of your own you have developed? With the large number of towns the Susquehanna passed through I have many opportunities to paint concrete. And with so many options I don't have enough time to try them all. I would like to hear from a number of you. When the responses come in I'll edit them together into a follow up article in a future edition of the Dispatcher. I prefer the text to be sent electronically for ease of editing, but will take it by snail mail as well. Now here are a few of the messages that were posted. First, the question:

Does anyone use a concrete colored paint suitable for the foundations and trim of plastic-type buildings? I tried Floquil and it is sort of a greenish gray. Yesterday I tried Poly-S and it comes out a medium gray that really doesn't even look like basement concrete. To me, a concrete paint should look like the sidewalks in front of most homes or the foundations of those homes. It should be like sandy pale white or sandy beige, not a medium gray that just doesn't look all that pleasing to the eye, at least for me.

You might want to look at the other Floquil colors. The not only have concrete but they also have aged concrete and one called foundation. The foundation is more of a beige color if I remember correctly.

I have tried Apple Barrel Colors 20575 Sandstone, Craft paint; looked ok to me you can change the tone by what your undercoat is. I found it at Wall-Mart in the art dept.

More Concrete

I have found Delta Ceramcoat Acrylic paint the best for concrete. For old concrete I use Sandstone, which has brown in it, and Mudstone, which is more on the gray side for new concrete. Mix it with white to get the color tone you want. I use Mudstone on station platforms and wash it with India ink to show dirt and age. You can buy it in Michael's Craft store for about 75 cents per 2 ounces. It sure beats the RR paints by color and price.

You might want to try Ceramcoat "Antique White" and weather it with grey chalks. I use the "sandstone" for concrete all the time. Ceramcoat is the greatest thing since sliced bread. The only place it's not so good is on metal.

I have found Delta Ceramcoat Acrylic paint the best for concrete. For old concrete I use Sandstone, which has brown in it, and Mudstone, which is more on the gray side for new concrete.

Unpainted concrete industrial buildings are common in New Zealand, and when I wanted to paint one that I had modeled I simply found one that was handy to me and went there on a Sunday morning - few people around to ask silly questions - with a bundle of color charts from the local paint stores and found paint that matched. For the record I used Resene grey nurse for the overall grey and then dabbed on a dark grey called Resene Zeus with a dabbing sponge, gradually building up the color until it looked right. The colors probably don't mean a thing to anyone outside New Zealand, and possibly Australia, but they can be seen on the Resene website. To compliment this I found a piece of concrete wall that wasn't covered in graffiti - it was around the Auckland zoo - took a photo of it. I then made several photocopies of the ensuing print on thin matt paper (cheap and nasty stuff). I have used this to "concrete" a wide variety of things such as bridge abutments, building foundations, walls, etc, on my 0 scale layout, and they actually look very good. After all, why go to a lot of effort to make something look like a photo, when the actual photo will do.

And here it gets interesting, when people started talking about spraying the Ceramcoat paint (editor)

I have used nothing but hobby acrylics in my airbrushes and I like it a lot. I thin with automotive windshield anti-freeze (as a lot of users do). I highly recommend its use. They also make a thinner for airbrush use, it is just called "Acrylic Thinner" from the "Painter's Helper" line. The bottle says start with a 50/50 mix and add more thinner as necessary. I have not personally used this yet.

Yes, it works in the airbrush, at least my Testors Aztek, it needs to be thinned, use the windshield washer stuff. The problem most modelers have is they use the small compressors, acrylic paint needs 40 to 45 pounds of pressure and the little ones can not reach that. I use a

nailing hot dog compressor works fine. By the way I spray Scale Coat without thinning. Harold Huber

I use acrylics all the time in my air brush. I thin with distilled water and clean airbrush with Windex, which does a great job. Never had a problem, but you must clean right away when you are finished spraying. I cannot use solvent based paints because of health problems.

I'm also a big fan of the Delta Ceramcoat paints for most of the reasons already mentioned; availability, price, wide color selection. I use them almost exclusively now. They airbrush just fine thinned to about a 4:6 ratio water to paint. I will have to try the windshield wiper fluid; I have not done that before. I clean up with hot soapy water and a nail brush to loosen any drying paint in the parts. I also spray clear water through the brush immediately after using it to avoid problems with paint drying in the mechanism. I use a Paasche H single action brush.

I have found coverage is much better, consistent and less likely to rub off or chip if the paint is applied over an automotive primer coat. I just use the bomb cans from Home Depot which work fine. I would be interested in finding out about a decent and easily obtained primer I could airbrush on instead.

Bits and Pieces

Powdered Graphite rubbed on items like a bulldozer blade or farm plow gives it the look of worn metal. I have used paint like silver then weathered it with rust, mud and grimy black. After these dry, brush on the graphite and see what it does.

Need to get plaster into a tight location? Use a children's medicine syringe. These are available for very little cost at your local pharmacy. Make a small thin batch of plaster, mix it until very smooth and draw it into the syringe. Place the nozzle in the area you want to fill and carefully squeeze it into the area until it

is filled. Depending on the setting speed of the plaster you are using you will need to work quickly. I have used this technique around retaining walls and to fill gaps between rock castings. It is quick and easy, and helps to reduce the mess that can sometimes happen when working with plaster.

One more thing, as soon as you are finished, draw water through the nozzle several times by placing it into a bowl of water and moving the plunger back and forth until it is clean. You all know what happens with plaster if it sits too long.

November Meet Directions

Getting to the meet location is actually quite easy. Curiously, describing how to get there is a little harder. But, here goes

The **Brandywine Town Center** is a large shopping complex located on an "ell"-shaped piece of property near the intersection of the Concord Pike (U.S. 202) and Naamans Road (Del 92). You may remember this as the former site of a race track. One leg of the "ell" joins the Concord Pike. The other leg joins Naamans Road. The complex includes the Regal Cinema, Lowe's, Michael's Arts & Crafts, Target, and many other stores. The main structure is surrounded by a maze-like parking lot which, in turn, is surrounded by a road which circles the perimeter.

The Center's **Community Building** (our meet location) is separate structure with a prominent central atrium. It is located next to a large decorative fountain, on the south side of the complex near the Naamans Road entrance.

From Concord Pike (U.S. 202) going south – a fraction of a mile south of the PA/DE state line, turn left into the Brandywine Town Center (the marker is the sign for Lowe's and Target, among others). Follow the perimeter road in either direction until you see the Community Building (near the decorative fountain).

From I-95 going south – at the state line, there is a three-way split – I-95, I-295, and Naamans Road (Del 92). Stay to the extreme right, and take the exit to Naamans Road. At the top of the ramp, turn right (west) on to Naamans Road. After a little over four miles, turn right into the Brandywine Town Center (it is opposite Shipley Road, which comes in from the left only). Turn right on to the perimeter road, and then left into the parking lot near the Community Building (which is near the decorative fountain).
