Once again the Philadelphia Division is planning to cross the Delaware River and join with the New Jersey Division to hold a joint meet. The meet will be held on January 17<sup>th</sup> at the Haddon Township High School in Haddon Township, New Jersey. For directions and a map please see page 5 of this issue of the Dispatcher. Doors will open at 8:30 with the meet and the clinics will start at 9:00 AM and running until 12:00 PM.

The clinics for this meet should provide something of interest for all. From the New Jersey side of the river there will be 2 clinics. One is a photographic look at locomotives of the 1970's with a primary focus on eastern roads. This was a time of great variety in motive power as opposed to today's rather uniform appearance.

The second clinic will be using commercial back drops to enhance our layouts. Not many of us are artists, so finding ways to increase the visual effectiveness of our railroads can be difficult. This clinic will help you do just that.

From the Philadelphia Division member Rich Newmiller will be presenting a clinic entitled "Modeling a Granite Quarry". Based on an operating granite quarry in Barre, Vermont that was photographed in 1995, the author attempts to build a realistic looking quarry model that also doubles as a removable access hatch for layout maintenance. Techniques for reproducing distinctive features such as stone surface textures and drilling marks, derricks, hoist houses, scratch built equipment and weathering will be described through a series of detailed construction photographs.

With these clinics it should be easy for you to find something to enhance your modeling efforts and rewards. Take the time now to plan to join us at the Haddon Township High School.

The contest for this meet will be weathered steam locomotive. Look over your roster and bring your best work to show off.

The New Jersey Division will have layout tours on both Friday night and Saturday afternoon. Maps for the Saturday tours will be available at the meet. To take part in the Friday night tours, type the following link into your browser, click on the "Resources" tab in the upper right corner, and then go to Latest Issue of their newsletter in the Clinkers section. www.njdivnmra.org

are a lot of odds and ends of windows, doors, siding, etc. laying around in my storage drawers that could be the basis for some interesting projects. Another step in the process was to look around and see which of my projects would be easiest to complete or are already done and still could be counted towards a certificate. # Modeling Stock yards

Anybody out there ever try to model a stock yard? I'm pretty sure none of us want to model the smell, but on the Susquehanna there were 2 companies that received stock cars in my era (1949), so I'm going to have to model at least one of them. Here are a few of the ideas I've gathered from the internet. I'd love to hear of any others of you might have.

One idea is to use peat moss and screen it to get rid of the big chunks. It is held it in place the same way you glue down you ballast. Another idea I heard was to use coffee grounds. This would be an easy one for me since I work in food service. I might get some strange looks from my staff, but it's free and I'm already using old tea leaves for ground cover. It is held in place the same way as mentioned before.

Another idea is decomposed granite. I'm not familiar with it but it is available at nursery yards. If it's less than a 500 lb bag I may give it a try.

Now the next thing to try is cow pies, or in my case pig or sheep pies. I grew up in farm country so I know how they smell. Rest assured when you visit the railroad next time there won't be any out of the ordinary odors.

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

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# Map to Haddon Township Division Meet



Starting at the Ben Franklin bridge, go East on Rt. 30 (Admiral Wilson Blvd.) That goes to Rt. 130. Follow the signs for Rt. 38 and Rt. 70 (stay in left lane). After going over Rt. 130, stay to the right to take Rt. 70 East. Travel for about 2 miles to Cuthbert Blvd, exit on the right. Take this exit and go about 2 miles, to the 5th traffic light. (The 4th traffic light is Haddon Avenue/Rt. 561 and is where Sattler's is located.) After crossing Park Avenue, watch for the driveway to the rear of the school on your left (shortly after the 7-11). If the rear driveway is closed due to weather, turn around and go back to Park Avenue. Turn right and go to Briarwood Avenue (about ¼ mile) and turn Right. Take the first right onto Memorial Avenue and follow it around to the school. The meet will be in the cafeteria at the back of the school.
