The Philadelphia Division is pleased to announce their next meeting will be held on Saturday, May 15, 2010 at the Montgomery Baptist Church, located at 510 Bethlehem Pike between Colmar and Montgomeryville PA. For directions and a map please see page 7 of this issue of this Dispatcher. The doors will open at 8:30 with the meet starting at 9:00 and running to approximately 12:00 PM. As always, here will be two clinics presented at the meet.

Clinic #1: Even though we are the Philly Division of the NMRA, how much do we really know about the rich industrial heritage of the city? For our main clinic for May, we will have something a little different but thoroughly entertaining and intriguing. Philadelphia industrial historian Harry Kyriakodis will present: "The Former Callowhill Industrial Corridor Of Philadelphia: A Virtual Walk Through Time". It focuses on the Reading RR's City Branch running through the area, the Norris & Baldwin locomotive works and other factories along the way, the Reading Viaduct, Willow Street, and the Reading's former operations along the DE River. Although Dick Foley gave a brief overview in January as to

how he will incorporate part of this into his layout, Harry is going much further in telling us the history of the industries in this area and how they were served by the railroads with many anecdotes of the "I never knew that!" variety. Harry is a member of the Philadelphia Chapter of the Society for Industrial Archeology whose members share a similar passion with model railroaders for industrial and railroad history.

Clinic #2: The originally scheduled DCC clinic has been unavoidably cancelled and will be rescheduled for a later date.
Assistant Super John Seibert will have a replacement by the meet.

At the conclusion of the meet there will be several railroads open for you to visit.

Our goal this meeting will be to expose some newer layouts on our open house tours. Some of these layouts are under partial or extensive construction and have scenery in various states of completion if at all. The owners have been hesitant to be open because they don't feel "ready", but we feel that there is a lot to be learned from seeing model railroads earlier in the construction process than we are used to.

As always, you are a guest in someone's home so please show

courtesy to our hosts and express your appreciation for them being open.

The popular vote contest for the meet will be passenger cars. These can be in any scale. Bring some of your efforts and share them with the group. Who knows, you may get some ideas to improve them too!

Coffee and donuts will be available during the meet, and there are a number of food outlets scattered along the Route 309 corridor for your lunch. Mark your calendars and we'll see you on the 15th.

All three have graciously agreed to continue as non-elected committee chairs. Please take a moment to thank them for the outstanding service they have provided and will continue to provide.

# **New Board Candidates**

The following four individuals are new candidates for the Philadelphia Division board of Directors.

Mark R. Wallace: My ancestors worked on the railroad, and it must have gotten into my blood. For as long as I can remember, I've been interested in railroading as a rail fan and a modeler. An architect in private practice, I enjoy designing layouts using CAD programs and kit-bashing models. As a member of the Western Maryland Historical Society, I am studying that line's infrastructure and rolling stock. I model a small portion of the WM in HO scale and guest operator on one of our member's layouts.

I'm in the process of dismantling a fifty-year-old 3-rail layout, which I inherited. My son and I are planning a larger HO layout that will incorporate scenes and operations of my favorite road. He's a student at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute. As a member of the legendary RPI Model Railroad Club, he spends Saturday afternoons refurbishing their layout, and has given me some good ideas! I have been a member of the NMRA and the Philadelphia Division since 2006. As a member of the Board, my goal would be to continue and support NMRA's effective and efficient administration as well as to strengthen the role of the Division as your 'personal' contact point for model railroading. I am aware of and appreciate the wide variety of scale modeling that folks build and operate. Through our Division's meetings and programs, I see an opportunity to educate and immerse both members and non-members about the possibilities in model railroading. Growing our membership and maintaining a healthy, welcoming organization where modelers can share techniques and new ideas is vital to sustaining an active community of railroad modelers.

Pat McTeigue: My Model Railroading interest was rekindled in 1983 when my stepson got an HO Layout on a fold up platform made of Styrofoam. The following Christmas it was moved onto a 4x8 sheet of plywood because the Styrofoam took a beating. He lost interest by February, but I didn't. I joined the North Penn Model Railroad Club and enjoyed the camaraderie and opportunities to learn techniques needed to build a smooth running railroad with realistic scenery. I was an office holder in the club for a couple years. During this time, I joined the NMRA and eventually became a Life-Member. In '92 I decided to go back to school to upgrade my Associates to a Bachelors Degree. During this period, the club had to vacate the home it had enjoyed for many years. Half of the then members decided to find a new home for the club and the others decided to form a round-robin club. I went with the second group. We are still active and now have several layouts that we are running Operations schedules on.

In 2004, after an early retirement package, I offered to help Steve Salotti on the 2006 NMRA Convention. He accepted my offer and I ended up being the Chairman of the Layout Tour Committee. The committee members did a fabulous job, which resulted in many great tours. Dave Messer let me take on some responsibilities for Marketing and Promotions for the convention. Working with the model railroading magazine editors and layout owners, I managed to get some articles published to highlight some layouts that we would have on our Layout Tours. We also got extensive free filler space Ads from Railroad Model Craftsman magazine. It's a plug they deserve.

On October 10, 2006, I was in a near fatal auto accident, on my way to an operating session. As a result of the accident, I'm blind and some of my joints make strange noises, but that hasn't stopped me from being active in Model Railroading. I'm sure there are ways I'll be able to help the Board of Directors for the Philadelphia Division. I had a successful career in Information Systems, including several years in management. I worked on systems for several business disciplines including: Sales, Marketing, Finance, Purchasing, Human Resources, production Operations including scheduling and inventory control. During these assignments, I was able to gain an understanding of their department's functional goals and how they hoped to use their resources to accomplish them It will be my pleasure to serve on the Board as a Director to help our Division accomplish its Current goals.

**Howard Kaplan**: My name is Howard Kaplan. I live with my wife in Drexel Hill, where I practice dentistry in an office in my home. As you might expect, my waiting room is full of railroad pictures and maps. Trains have been a love of mine all my life, but other than a small, N scale layout during high school, I've mostly been an armchair modeler, waiting for that perfect time and basement to build a serious layout. Hopefully that's just around the corner.

I grew up in northeast Philadelphia and used to hang around at Reading's Cheltenham station taking photos and watching Reading, CNJ and B&O trains roll off the New York Short Line. And every chance I could I took the train into Reading Terminal. It shouldn't be suprising, then, that I intend to model the Reading primarily in Philadelphia in the '60s, including the commuter operations complete with catenary, with visits from B&O and CNJ, in N scale. And the dental instruments and materials should come in very handy. In fact I've even thought of having the railroad run into the treatment room and deliver materials chairside. In the meantime I have been honing my skills by helping a friend work on his N scale layout.

My related railroad memberships include the Reading Company Technical & Historical Society and the Anthracite Railroad Historical Society. I've been a member of the NMRA since 1981 and the Philadelphia division since 1993, and have attended almost every meeting since then. But until now my only real participation has been as a bus captain for layout tours during the 2006 Independence Junction convention. I feel I've reaped the rewards of membership for many years and now I'd like to contribute more. I'd very much appreciate your vote for Board of Directors.

Joe Bergmaier: My interest in railroading began when I was only a couple of years old. At that time we lived in Kensington on 2<sup>nd</sup> & Susquehanna. The block behind us was American Street and the Reading Railroad. My father used to take me over to watch them switch trains and tie up traffic on all the east-west cross streets. When I was 6, we moved to Bucks County and our house was a block from the PRR New York mainline. I grew up watching GG-1's in their full splendor. We used to call them "ghosts" because they came and went so fast.

A few years later, my father let me help him build the layout in the basement and that's when I started becoming a model railroader. Today I'm using that same frame work on my layout and still have a couple of the cars. My dad collected brass when it first came out and I was lucky enough to inherit his entire collection.

I started my own collection after I got married and have been involved with model railroading since then. I was a member of Chelten Hills for almost 20 years until my day job consumed all of my free time. I still tinkered with the trains, built some kits and dreamed of the day when I had the time, space and resources to build my dream layout. But a funny thing happened – it turns out my dream layout is now quite different than what I imagined.

I'm a big fan of the Pennsy, Reading and B&O and my layout is being designed to incorporate all three of these roads. Since joining the NMRA, I've met so many great people that are constantly inspiring me to push the limits of modeling. They have invited me to see their layouts, join operating sessions and round robin groups. It is a great gift to see how others approach this great hobby.

I would be honored to serve on the Board in any capacity. If elected to office, I promise to work hard to repay those who have helped me, by helping others succeed in achieving their dreams.


