Superintendent's Memo



How I Got a Free DCC Throttle!

When I started my current job – my real job, that is - back at the

beginning of 2011, my new boss bought me a wireless DCC throttle. I just didn't know it at the time.

What he really got for me was an iPhone so that he could keep tabs on me and send me e-mail anywhere I happened to be. Then one night at a round robin get together fellow division member Rob Hinkle told me about the wonders of JMRI and how I could use my new iPhone as a throttle. Forgive me if you already know all this.

JMRI (Java Model Railroad Interface) is free, downloadable, open source software that allows you to use a Mac, PC or Linux computer as an interface to your railroad. There are modules in it that you can use to program decoders, create a PC based dispatcher panel, operate signaling, and a host of other capabilities.

Visit the web site at http://jmri.sourceforge.net/. You will find clinics and other resources to walk you through the various capabilities of the software. I found my WIFI Throttle Lite free app by browsing the iPhone app store. It downloaded in 20 seconds.

Paul Cappelloni uses JMRI software using his old, retired PC connected to his DCC system through a USB cable. The iPhone connects to his wireless router and Tah Dah! You're running trains on his layout from your phone. I-Pads, Androids and other smart phones also work. JMRI supports most of the major brands of DCC systems.

I'm just getting my feet wet, but I'll be glad to pass along what I find out as I begin to use it.

Directions to the May 5th Joint Meet

Delaware Valley College is located on Route 202 just south of Doylestown, PA.


From the South, East and West:

Use the Penna Turnpike – exit at Willow Grove. Proceed on 611 north to Doylestown bypass. Follow the bypass to route 202 south (not north), Exit at Doylestown Hospital. Follow 202 south 1/3rd mile to Del Val College on the left at Iron Bridge Road.

From the North: Use 611 south to Doylestown bypass. Exit onto 202 south at Doylestown Hospital. Follow directions above.

Local directions: Enter the Del Val campus at the main entrance on route 202. The Student Center is the second building on the left as you enter. Use the parking areas to the right (towards the stadium).

Enter the Student Center from the center courtyard entrance. The meet is on the second floor to the left of the entrance (Music Room).

Meeting Times and Dates

The division meets 5 times a year in January, March, May, September and November. Our next meet is planned for May again with our friends the East Coast Santa Fe Modelers group.

Yearly Report Continued

We continue to support various local model railroad clubs through publicity in our divison newsletter, the Dispatcher. We also report on progress of individual members layouts plus news within the model railroad community.

We have assisted our RPM Committee in planning and running their Valley Forge RPM meet held March 23 to 25 at the Desmond Hotel in Malvern, PA. This is becoming a well-known event among modelers up and down the East Coast. There was a record number of presenters and attendees at 280.

Any successful or new ideas that your division has tried that might be helpful to other divisions. We have procured, through money earned by car sales and the RPM, state-of the art audio-visual equipment. We have our own laptop, digital projector, portable wide-screen, and high resolution camera. The camera in particular has proven itself to be invaluable to allowing the audience to get a close-in view of a hands-on demonstration.

We successfully held a remote clinic whereby the clinician was not actually present at the venue at the time, but gave it from a remote location. The presenter was the MER's own Marshall Abrams who, along with a few members of the division, wrote an article for the NMRA magazine on giving clinics remotely. This broadens the availability of clinicians.

Provide more communication within the model railroad community as to the MER and division's existence, activities, and overall benefits of NMRA membership. After all, this is a grass roots type organization.

Nurture and support an <u>active</u> pool of clinicians who volunteer to rotate throughout the MER in presenting quality clinics. The capability exists to give clinics to multiple remote venues simultaneously, thus giving broader exposure to the clinic with less strain on the presenters.

Quite a bit of news came out of the Winter NMRA Board of Directors meeting last week. I'm going to split it between this edition of the InfoNet News and next month's, to make sure you get a chance to see everything.

News from the Board meeting:

- Tom Draper, manager of the National Train Show, reported that the number of booth sales for the show at Grand Rails 2012 is currently at the same level it was at this time last year for the show in Sacramento.
- After a necessarily short search by the NMRA Canada Nominating Committee, Clark Kooning volunteered
 for an appointment as NMRA Canada Director when Don Hillman stepped down from the job for
 health reasons. We wish Don all the best, and thank Clark for his willingness to serve at the last
 minute.
- Financially, the NMRA ended 2011 in very good standing and is currently rebuilding some of its funds
 from which it had borrowed in the past. In addition there is currently enough money in the budget to
 hire an IT professional to repair, maintain, and update the NMRA website.
- The NMRA has announced an agreement of cooperation between itself and the <u>Hasea.com</u> Model Railroad Association (HRMA) of China, a community of over 100,000 railfans and model railroaders. The HRMA, a relatively young organization, is interested in learning how the NMRA is organized, and will promote NMRA standards in China. Members of both organizations will be able to enjoy the many benefits of each. A press release and story will appear shortly in NMRA Magazine.
- The Board is in the initial stages of studying **electronic balloting** as a way of both saving on postage and encouraging additional member participation.

As I promised last month, here's the remainder of the news that came out of the winter Board of Directors meeting, held February 8 & 9, 2012, in Las Vegas.

News from the Board meeting:

- The NMRA has a new <u>Development Department Manager</u>, charged with seeking out new donation sources and methods, and coming up with ways to expand our fundraising potential. Alan Anderson of Salt Lake City, UT, volunteered to fill the slot, which had been vacant for several years. In his full-time job, Alan works with a Salt Lake City area chamber of commerce.
- The "Cruise Convention" idea was officially declared "not popular enough to pursue."

 Initial estimates, dictated that the idea receive approximately 800 firm commitments from NMRA members, and only about 300 were received via the survey, which was printed several times in NMRA Magazine and also sent to Sacramento convention attendees.
- The NMRA is in the final stages of selecting a <u>volunteer Marketing Department</u>
 <u>Manager</u>. To date, several professional candidates have responded to a "help wanted" ad in *NMRA Magazine*. The Marketing Director will help the NMRA identify ways to retain and re-rail members, as well as recruit new ones.
- Jenny Hendricks, NMRA Administration Director, reports that the number of <u>RailPass</u>
 <u>members who convert</u> to Regular members has reached the 80% mark.
 Congratulations to all of you whose hard work has made this goal a reality! Maybe we should try for 90- 100%?
- The Celebration of Models in Grand Rapids will introduce a <u>new contest award</u> in memory of Dean Freytag, the "Dean of Styrene" and former national Contest Chair. The award is funded by a donation given to the NMRA in memory of Freytag and is named "The Dean Freytag Industrial Structure Award." The winning structure will be selected by the Contest Chairman.

In other news:

- White River Productions, the company that prints NMRA Magazine, announced that it has purchased the assets of the now-defunct magazine, Model Railroad News.
- NMRA Secretary Bob Gangwish reports that the updated version of the Executive Handbook is now posted on www.nmra.org and can be downloaded.

Welcome to the April 2012 InfoNet News eblast!

- Fundraising has begun for the "Magic of Scale Model Railroading" gallery at the California State Railroad Museum in Sacramento, CA. As your members will probably recall, this gallery will introduce the Museum's 600,000 annual visitors to the hobby, as well as give them a sense of its history. One of the highlights of the gallery will be actual portions of the finest model railroads ever built. The Museum has donated the space rent-free to the NMRA for the purpose of promoting the hobby. It's estimated that the cost to build the exhibit will be approximately \$750,000, and no NMRA dues or monies will be used; instead, it will be entirely funded by donations. To date, over \$100,000 has been raised, and an anonymous donor has agreed to match donations, up to \$250,000.
- Any NMRA member (or non-member, for that matter) who would like to donate to the funding of the gallery should send his or her tax-deductable donation to NMRA Headquarters at 4121 Cromwell Road., Chattanooga, TN 37421-2119, and mark it "Gallery donation."
- In the February edition of the InfoNet News we reported the agreement of
 cooperation between the NMRA and the Hasea.com Model Railroad
 Association of China. This July we'll be seeing the first fruits of that "Hands
 Across The Ocean" agreement as a group of teenage Chinese modelers and
 railfans visits California with the purpose of seeing layouts, prototype trains, and
 the California State Railway Museum. Several Pacific Coast Region members are
 helping to organize this 2-week event.
- Grand Rails 2012, the upcoming NMRA national convention, has announced their
 commemorative convention car. Grand Rapids, Michigan, was once known as
 The Furniture Capital of the World, and appropriately the model was inspired by a
 postcard photograph of a turn-of-the-last-century furniture manufacturer's wood sided boxcar. This replica, produced by Accurail, comes complete with a Grand
 Rails 2012 logo "poster" which can be applied by the modeler. Visit
 www.gr2012.org to see a shot of the prototype.
- The folks at Grand Rails 2012 have posted a preliminary clinic schedule for the convention in PDF format, downloadable at their website. Among the clinicians are NMRA Worldwide Director Tony Koester, Jim Six, Jim Sacco, and a group of clinics by the Layout Design Sig.
- Grand Rails 2012 is looking for volunteers who'd be willing to donate an hour or
 two of their time at the convention doing things like contest room security, helping
 with registration check-in, silent auction set-up and tear-down, and

MAY JOINT MEET LAYOUT TOUR

The following is an excerpt from an email sent by board member Pat McTeigue describing Ron Patzer's outstanding layout. Ron's layout will be open for inspection on Saturday from 1 to 4 pm. It is a "must see."



"I'm sure Ron told me the dimensions of the basement but I did not record them and cannot recall them. If I had to guess, I would say 24 X 40. He has two famous viaducts modeled on the railroad: in the crew lounge is the Nicholson Viaduct and out in the large room is the Starrucca Viaduct. I can remember the Nicholson Viaduct and can tell you, photos do not do it justice. It is amazing. It is certainly one of the

best pieces of modeling I have seen.

He covers a large time period, which is 1945 to 1970. That period includes the evolution of the roads modeled being the Erie and the DL&W which merged into the Erie-Lackawanna.

The origin and destination of the layout are Hoboken, NJ through Chicago, IL. Towns modeled are Scranton, PA, Binghamton, NY, and Elmira, NY. Port Jervis Yard is modeled.

There are three helixes that have sidings in them to serve as staging locations. The helixes are also used to put distance between towns. This way, the tail end of the train is not in the prior town as you are working the current town.

The layout is now DCC. Eighty engines have decoders, fifty of which are sound units. Most sound units are Tsunamis. A few are BLI and Genesis.

Infrared detection is used to determine if staging tracks are occupied. Status is displayed on control panels.

Occupancy detection is being installed for roadside signaling. This project is still under way.

An article was done on Ron's layout in Model Railroader back in late 2006."



New Membership Recruitment Program

As an aid to membership recruitment, NMRA recently instituted a six month "Railpass" trial membership program which costs the applicant \$9.95. Building on this idea, the MER is instituting a program whereby it will pay the \$9.95 Railpass fee for interested applicants in the MER. In other words, we are making available FREE six month Railpass trial memberships to encourage recruitment of regular members.

What's covered?

Same as Railpass—receive six issues of NMRA Magazine, three issues of The Local, eligibility to attend conventions and meets, eligibility to participate in contests.

What's not covered?

Same as Railpass—applicants cannot vote or hold office, and will not receive the New Member Pak from national (it's rather expensive).

Who can be recruited?

Anyone living within the MER who has not been a member of NMRA during the past two years.

How will the recruitment process work?

(1) The prospective member fills out the MER trial membership application form which was sent to all division superintendents (not the standard NMRA Railpass form) (2) The "recruiter" should

also sign the form, and then forward it to: Fred Miller, MER Busi- ness Manager, 333 W. Trade St, Unit #2504, Charlotte, NC 28202- 1961. (3) Fred will record the information he needs in his data base, and will forward the application to the MER Treasurer. (4) The Treasurer will add the necessary check and forward the application and check to the national headquarters in Chattanooga.

What happens after the member's six month trial period?

The Railpass trial member will receive a standard dues notice from national headquarters. We hope a substantial number of Railpass trial members will sign up to become regular members.

Are there limits on the program?

The MER initially allocated \$2,000 for this program. The Board recently allocated an additional \$1,000 to extend the program to the end of 2010, or when the funds are spent – whichever comes first. When and if we approach either limit, Division Superintendents and members of the MER Board of Directors will be notified. At that time, the program will be evaluated by the MER Board of Directors. If successful, we will try to continue it. For questions?
