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This last Sept 28, 2013, for our first fall meet of the Philadelphia Division, we returned to an old familiar place; the Church of the Nazarene located in Fairview Village, central Montgomery County. It has been

over four years since we last met since new locations have been discovered as our Division strives to provide a variety of exciting and convenient venues for our regular meets

Superintendent Joe Bergmaier opened the Meet with some general announcements as well as introduced the Officers and Directors. Assisting Superintendent Charles Butcsh is also chairing the Membership Committee where the Division is being subdivided on a county level to help aid in coordinating activities and reaching out to our members. New Director Rob Hinkle, who also wears a hat as the Secretary of the NMRA's OPSIG, will be coordinating Operations themed program in the near future. Stay tuned.

Our first Clinician was Robert (Bob) Charles MMR. As a former National President of the NMRA, President of the Mid-Eastern Region (MER) and actively involved in the Achievement Program, Bob presented a talk on how to go about earning the various Achievement Program (A.P.).

A little background; Each Division in the NMRA have two primary missions. First is to hold regular Meets that feature labs, talks and activities about all things model railroading. Our Division goes further by having various near-by layouts available for visiting and observing. In this manner, we encourage the sharing of each others efforts, knowledge, enthusiasm and ideas. The Division's Second Mission is to sponsor and encourage participation in the NMRA Achievement Program. The earning of Certificates is one of the traditional core programs in the NMRA that is open to all NMRA members. It is a great way to memorialize individual effort in the various aspects of model railroading. We as a Division offer this program not as a contest, ranking or race but as a way of encouraging and recognizing the efforts of individual modelers. Each modeler creates their own Achievement Program based on their particular interests with the certificates they earn. The Division's 2013-14 Board of Directors have chosen to emphasize this second mission: the Achievement Program this year. We should all take advantage of this opportunity.

Bob Charles led off his talk with the tale of the typical modeler who has constructed a decent size layout, installed the track, wired up the entire network has built the scenery with buildings, bridges, tunnels and is happily running trains in some manner. Many times without realizing it, this modeler has already qualified for the NMRA's 'Golden Spike' Award! While this award does not count towards the AP for an MMR, it is a merit certificate for

effort as well as local, regional and national recognition. It puts your layout on our radar too as a new and exciting place for future visits and more. When Bob challenged the group about constructing their layouts, several raised their hands. Bob explained how members can go on to complete the process and obtain that Golden Spike.

Bob went on to describe the AP system, with its judging process, merit system of awarding points, and paperwork – yes paperwork. Bob took a number of very tough questions from fellow members about the AP. Bob and the other judges in the AP are trying to keep the judging ethical by encouraging the recruitment of more judges that will allow others to step aside if say, their



model was being judged. And then there is paperwork. Bob suggested paperwork is should be rightly thought of as, 'Documentation.' Another words, it is "How Your Stuff Works." Our resident MMR, Dave Messer also commented on the how the AP provides national recognition for a member's modeling efforts. Each notice of an earned certificate is published in the NMRA magazine in the monthly AP column.

At the end of Bob's talk, Superintendent Joe introduced Brian Good as the new AP Coordinator. Dave Messer will continue on the AP committee as resident MMR and judge. Members of the Division will receive training at next months M.E.R. Convention and will participate in the AP committee as they earned their respective certificates. Dave was also acknowledged for his years of service as AP Coordinator.

Then after a short break, we were treated to what I refer as "A 21st century moment." Bill Fagan and Earl Paine presented a clinic on "Videography; a View from the Train." Bill, who has been a member of the round-robin both the author and Earl associate with, has been mounting a miniature video camera on a flat car. The car is pushed by a locomotive through an entire layout. It's very effective with sound. Dubbed the "I-Car" (No trademark yet), this very cool method of documenting a railroad not only spot problems with the track, scenery but it can locate lost tools and introduce the layout to prospective or seasoned operators. Bill explained how he adapted a Looxcie 'Z' mini cam mounted on a flat car. He has an HO and 'N' scale version. He likes to use metal wheels, as the sound will indicate when a joint is bad. He can control the

camera with a smartphone or tablet in real time. Bill then uploads the video to You-Tube for viewing by the public. This way the video of the railroad can be viewed by anyone with a high-speed internet connection. You can catch some of Bills efforts here: http://www.youtube.com/user/bfagan777.

Bill has videoed several local layouts as well as the late GATSME layout for posterity. Using Bill's video, Earl showed his layout and explained how the video helped him spot areas where the track need improvement or fixing. I said this was a 21st century moment since the size of the video allows real-time viewing 'From the Cab' for scales that had here-to-fore been much too small. A well sceniced and tracked model railroad appears very convincing to a viewer. If you contact him, Bill will come to your location and video your layout without charge. He only asks that you allow him to post the video on You-Tube. There were many comments and the group enjoyed the presentation.

After another short break of fellowship refreshments, Mike Rabbitt presented his Clinic on Modeling Open Hearth Steel Production. An open-hearth furnace is the principal steel making equipment to take raw materials and produce steel. The steel is then shipped to either a rolling mill, shaping mill, sheet metal or similar facility to create the various finished shapes and sizes used in the manufacture of all kinds of products. The railroads were key to this industry. Mike brought a model of an Open Hearth Furnace with accessory buildings constructed from scratch in HO scale. Mike has studied metallurgy and especially the design of steel mills in their various forms and locations. His remarkable model exhibited the intricate framing of the steel structure that was similar to buildings found at places like Homestead, Edgar Thompson, Bethlehem, Alan Wood, Phoenix and many described other plants. He several configurations of track plans that can be used for modeling. Mike itemized for us the mold, ingot, charging boxes as well as the ladle cars typically utilized on either standard or narrow gauge track. He also reviewed with us, the typical number of loads that various raw materials as well as the type of finished products a typical mill produced.

Mike showed the group his process of modeling a furnace with illustration board, CAD drawings and various other techniques. With photos, he showed the model being assembled. He displayed several techniques for platform construction. He discussed the various several configurations for providing railroad service that included placement for the raw materials and pick-up of the finished products. The group thoroughly enjoyed Mike's presentation.

Finally, we paused and recognized Brian Good for his years of service on the Board of Directors and Treasurer with a certificate of appreciation and a round of applause. Brian is continuing to serve the Division in his new

position as AP Coordinator. If you have any questions, concerns or interest in the AP, Brian is the Division Coordinator. And one more thing, the Division is expanding our 'social media' presence on the web with a Facebook page. Rob Hinkle is assigned the task of organizing the page so that soon you will be able to 'Like Us' and be treated to new connections.

Open House Tours: Normally Division members open and invite us to visit their layouts. The Saturday afternoon layouts were both HO scale and located within a short driving distance from our Meet's location. Both of the layouts, Mike Rabbitts and Earl Paine's were briefly discussed to give prospective visitors an idea of each layout's features.

Mike Rabbitt's extensive layout was built over the last 20 years and occupies most of the lower level of his house. He has a series of connected tables with protruding peninsulas that feature a large city, a port, a town & country scene and of a course; a major steel mill. The mill contains models of Bessemer furnaces, open-hearth furnace like the one presented as well as various mills for finishing products. Through it, a railroad runs through it. Mike still operates with DC in blocks. This form of powering and operating was the standard method of operating trains prior to the introduction of DCC. Mike's main train shed was inspired by the Southern Pacific's shed in San Diego California. The steel mill is adapted from several locations and prototypes that Mike has studied.

Earl Paine's Reading Railroad themed layout takes up much of his basement as well. Having grown up between Norristown and Betzwood, Earl is one of the few local modelers who is modeling from his younger days, but also lives near to the prototype. As such, he has modeled Abrams Yard and places like Norristown, Bridgeport, Royersford, Pottstown, Birdsboro and of course Reading. Earl has been building the layout for nearly nine years with the help of his round robin group. He hopes to get into operations as well as start the push on fully scenicing his layout. He hopes to earn many AP certificates as well. You can catch glimpses of Earl's layout on Bill Fagan's You-Tube channel.

A gracious 'Thank You' to the member Steve Salotti and the Church of the Nazarene – Fairview Village for allowing us to meet as well as to our clinicians Bob, Bill, Earl and Mike. We also thank the Earl and Mike for allowing us the opportunity to visit with them and their layouts. Of note, Steve Salotti was going to have his layout available but had to cancel at the last minute. We look forward to visiting soon.

To all of the Members of the Division, thanks for coming out to our event, it was great to see you. On Saturday morning, Nov 2nd, we will be in Wilmington Delaware for next meet featuring some great clinics, with some of our hoppers still available, Division shirts, a model display table, and a raffle. Sylvan Trucks ...by Steve Salotti

In the process of trying to create an interesting and reasonably accurate model railroad we often spend a great amount of time researching our favorite prototypes structures, terrain, and freight or passenger cars. For example, with my layout set firmly in 1949, I know the Susquehanna bought Budd RDC cars and stainless passenger cars, and started painting their diesels in a new silver and maroon scheme in 1950, none of which I want on my railroad. Also, I've learned that PRR cars with shadow keystones are a no-no (they didn't come out until around 1955). Another area that can get complicated is the types of motor vehicles that were in use during the era I'm trying to portray. Specifically, what types of trucks were common in that era and what services were they involved in?

Fortunately the manufacturers have started doing a great job in providing us with reasonably accurate models of both cars and trucks from many different periods. Products continue to pour into the market from several manufacturers such as Athearn, Classic Metal Works (Mini Metals) and several others. One of my own personal favorites is Sylvan Scale Models from Ontario, Canada. This company continues to turn out an ever increasing array of trucks and cars from the '30s on into the '60s and '70s. And to me, the best part is that they are kits! Now mind you, I'm not opposed to keeping those Chinese folks working, but I actually prefer to "build my own" if you will. While these kits don't just snap together, with a little care and time you can create some unique vehicles to bring your scene to life.

One of my recent projects has been to build a series of 1932 tractors and trailers lettered for the Mushroom Transportation Company. Do you remember those bright orange trucks from years ago? Sylvan recently released a trailer and tractor kit that is from the appropriate era and a good size to fit on my railroad. That, along with a set of decals was all I needed to get the project completed (the decals are listed at the end of this article).



The models I chose were the Sylvan V-085, '41-'47 Ford COE tractor, and the T-009 '32 Fruehauf Aero Van trailer. In Figure 1 we see two of the tractors, the one on the right as they come out of the box, and the one on the left having been carefully cleaned of flash and any molding imperfections. These are resin kits and while their flexible rubber molds do allow imperfections to happen, they are easy to remove with careful sanding and filling.

The tools used to prep the models were X-Acto knives, needle files, sandpaper, and emory sticks. Since the models are made of resin they also are somewhat easy to break, so care must be taken when removing flash to not damage the models details. Extra care should also be used on delicate details like the front window divider. All is not lost, though, if you break something. They can often be

easily repaired with cyanoacrylate (ACC) or many other types of glue, and styrene or other types of material.

Once cleaned of flash, the next step is to carefully wash the parts in a mild soap solution. My preferred choice is Pine Sol, but many other products will work as well. A word of caution though: some solvent based cleaners may damage the resins. Figure 2 shows the parts for two of the kits in a small strainer being dipped into a diluted solution. The models are held in the strainer and gently shaken in the solution for a few minutes. They are then rinsed in cold running water and

spread out on a towel to dry. Once the models are cleaned and dry it is time to start the assembly process. You may work in any sequence you choose, but most often I start with the chassis. Due to slight imperfections in the molding process, the wheel hubs will not always fit into the axle. I check each one and carefully sand the axle end until there is a snug but not overly tight fit. Remember that when they are painted there will be little paint build up on the parts, but you don't want them too wobbly, either. Next comes installing the axles on the frame. The axle will have small tabs that theoretically fit in holes cast on the frame. Check for alignment, then ACC the parts in place. If they don't line up carefully, fill them or if needed, cut them off and drill for a small piece of wire to hold them firmly in place.



This also a good time to add other details if desired. On some vehicles I've added items like exhaust pipes and mufflers. A future project is to figure out an appropriate material to use to model mud flaps. Any ideas?

The next step is to paint the under frame. I start with a coat of grimy or weathered black paint for most of the frame and axles. After that is fully dried, I come back and dry brush lightly with rust for some parts and roof brown or earth for others. Often I will paint the fuel tank the same color as the cab or company colors, but it's your choice how you want to do it.



Next is the interior. Due to the small size of the windows I don't put a lot of detail inside. The kits come with a driver and steering wheel which are painted in whatever colors suit me. The floor is usually painted gray and the seats leather or military brown. The driver is painted in typical work clothes colors and the steering wheel is glued into his hands. He is then glued onto the driver seat and the cab placed on to make sure it fits (do not glue it in place at this time).

Depending on the year and model of truck you are assembling you may need to add items like headlights and mirrors. On the trucks shown here both are needed. The headlights are cast with a rather substantial post to hold them in place. I carefully sand

them to a thinner profile then drill holes where they are to be mounted. I use a reamer to carefully enlarge the hole until they fit and sit properly. The mirrors require only a small hole and ACC to hold them in place. In order to keep the mirror part of the assembly clean during painting I put a small piece of masking tape where the glass mirror would be.

The next step is to paint the cabs. While I've done multiple color schemes, I prefer single colors due to the small areas you have to work in. In Figure 3, we have two cabs and under frames painted and ready to assemble. Note that the frames have not been weathered yet, but the 5th wheel has a coat of shiny black to simulate grease. The grills on the cab are painted with chrome silver by brush and the trim has been highlighted by using a needle dipped in the same paint carefully traced along the cast ridges. While it may seem tedious, it is easy to do with a little practice and patience. In this case the cabs were painted reefer orange to approximate the color on the Mushroom Transportation trucks they will be lettered for.

Also shown in Figure 3 are the wheel and tire assemblies. The rims are mostly painted the same color as the cabs and the tires are filed to remove flash from the center and an emery board is used to trim up the outside. After they are installed they will be weathered as desired. When installing the wheels, care should be taken to make sure all of them sit flat on the ground. Due to the flexibility of resin, the parts don't always come out perfectly shaped. As we finish the cab,

the next step is to install the glass. Sylvan includes clear styrene to form the windows, but I prefer to use Micro Scale's "Micro Krystal Klear" to form the windows in place. While not as clear as the styrene, I find it easier to use and results are very good. Once the windows are dry, the cab will be glued onto the frame and allowed to dry.

The next part of the job is to tackle the trailer. For these trucks I selected a '32 Fruehauf trailer, appropriate for my 1949 time period. Figure 4 shows the parts after being cleaned and washed. Assembly is very straightforward, with the most difficult part being getting the landing gear in place with the small wire braces. You will need to decide if you want the wheels retracted as when in transit, or fully extended as when unhitched from the tractor.



When modeling them retracted, I usually cut the wheels off, shorten the leg, and then drill the leg and insert a small length of wire. I then drill the wheel to match, and use ACC to hold them in place. The frame is assembled and painted as a unit, and the body is completed and painted. The trailer shown above is a refrigerated unit, which is an option on these kits. Once painting is complete, the frame and box can be assembled and the trailer is ready for decaling and weathering.

Decals are available from a number of sources, but as with model railroading, some manufacturers have gone out of business or are "cottage" industries run at the owner's whim. The decals used here are available from Custom Decals, a cottage industry from Florida. The Mushroom decals are not listed on his web site, but he does make them. Service can be



a little slow, but if you're patient, you will get what you order.

The Sylvan trucks themselves can be a little hard to find, but we are fortunate that Lin's Junction in Lansdale, PA stocks a supply of them and will order them for you. For a complete list of Sylvan products, see their website: www.svlvanscalemodels.com.

Figure 5 shows the completed truck with light weathering applied and ready to compete with the railroad for business.

November Meet Directions

The **Brandywine Town Center** is a large shopping complex located on an "ell"-shaped piece of property near the intersection of the Concord Pike (U.S. 202) and Naamans Road (Del 92). You may remember this as the former site of a race track. One leg of the "ell" joins the Concord Pike. The other leg joins Naamans Road. The complex includes the Regal Cinema, Lowe's, Michael's Arts & Crafts, Target, and many other stores. The main structure is surrounded by a maze-like parking lot which, in turn, is surrounded by a road which circles the perimeter.

The Center's **Community Building** (our meet location) is a separate structure with a prominent central atrium. It is located next to a large decorative fountain, on the south side of the complex near the Naamans Road entrance.

From Concord Pike (U.S. 202) going south – a fraction of a mile south of the PA/DE state line, turn left into the Brandywine Town Center (the marker is the sign for Lowe's and Target, among others). Follow the perimeter road in either direction until you see the Community Building (near the decorative fountain).

From I-95 going south – at the state line, there is a three-way split – I-95, I-295, and Naamans Road (Del 92). Stay to the extreme right, and take the exit to Naamans Road. At the top of the ramp, turn right (west) on to Naamans Road. After a little over four miles, turn right into the Brandywine Town Center (it is opposite Shipley Road, which comes in from the left only). Turn right on to the perimeter road, and then left into the parking lot near the Community Building (which is near the decorative fountain).

Between 1950 and 1957 the Reading purchased several thousand offset-side, 55-ton, twin hoppers built by long-time supplier Bethlehem Steel. These cars, classified as HTv, became one of the largest single classes of cars on the road's roster. Lasting into the Conrail era, they were used to haul a variety of bulk commodities including anthracite and crushed stone, and with some modifications, sand, slag and ferromanganese ore.

The initial production runs were painted black with the red and white "Anthracite" herald and the road name and other lettering in Railroad Roman. Beginning in 1952 the road name was changed to the large speed lettering, which is the scheme used for the exquisite Kadee model being offered now by the Philadelphia Division in six exclusive road numbers.

A UNIFORM is a garment that unifies the appearance of a group of people who share common interests or purpose. Within the realm of model/prototype railroading, social organizations such as clubs, historical societies, and now even NMRA divisions typically offer some kind of uniform for their members in an effort to promote their mission and activities, and to instill pride in their members. In addition, many events such as conventions, including our own RPM, provide shirts or hats for their staff.

With that in mind, the Philadelphia Division is now offering its own uniform to its members, the Port Authority "Silk Touch" polo shirt, a high quality, 50/50 cotton/polyester knit, in black, with the division logo on the left chest, and if desired, a single name embroidered on the right.

With regard to its composition, some balk at polyester, but the advantages are that enables the shirts to be very lightweight and imparts a silky feel making them very comfortable. In addition, it virtually eliminates shrinking and wrinkling.

The color black was chosen to be railroad neutral (although WM guys might gladly dispute that) and because it contrasts well with our logo. And, of course, black is slimming—it makes our division members look fit and trim. (And isn't that consistent with the make believe world of our hobby?)

Also, don't let the price fool you. This is one of the most popular shirts chosen by organizations for their members and staff—it is not junk. However, the idea was to keep the price low in order to enable as many members as possible to purchase one. This is not a fundraising project; members pay the actual cost.

The division logo is very graphic intensive which made it difficult and expensive to directly embroider onto the shirts. In addition, most embroidered items have minimum quantity requirements which would have resulted in considerable waiting periods to accumulate enough orders. Doing the logo as a patch has enabled us to reproduce the detail while saving money by purchasing blank shirts and having the patches sewn on as needed. And any quantity (even a single shirt) can be purchased at any time for the same low price. Sample shirts for sizing are brought to every meet, and there are always a few new ones without embroidered names available for immediate purchase. We hope that all members will take advantage of this opportunity and display their division pride by wearing this handsome shirt.





Building on this idea, the MER is instituting a program whereby it will pay the \$9.95 Railpass fee for interested applicants in the MER. In other words, we are making available FREE six month Railpass trial memberships to encourage recruitment of regular members.

What's covered?

Same as Railpass—receive six issues of **NMRA Magazine**, three issues of **The Local**, eligibility to attend conventions and meets, eligibility to participate in contests.

What's not covered?

Same as Railpass—applicants cannot vote or hold office, and will not receive the New Member Pak from national (it's rather expensive).

Who can be recruited?

Anyone living within the MER who has not been a member of NMRA during the past two years.

How will the recruitment process work?

(1) The prospective member fills out the MER trial membership application form which was sent to all division superintendents (not the standard NMRA Railpass form) (2) The "recruiter" should

also sign the form, and then forward it to: Bob Price, Business Manager, 666 Princeton Avenue Collingswood, NJ 08108. (3) Bob will record the information he needs in his data base, and will forward the application to the MER Treasurer. (4) The Treasurer will add the necessary check and forward the application and check to the national headquarters in Chattanooga.

What happens after the member's six month trial period?

The Railpass trial member will receive a standard dues notice from national headquarters. We hope a substantial number of Railpass trial members will sign up to become regular members.

Are there limits on the program?

The MER initially allocated \$2,000 for this program. The Board recently voted to extend the program to the end of 2013, or when the funds are spent – whichever comes first. When and if we approach either limit, Division Superintendents and members of the MER Board of Directors will be notified. At that time, the program will be evaluated by the MER Board of Directors. If successful, we will try to continue it.

A few words from the President Model Railroading is Fun



The title of this column was prominently displayed for many years on the masthead of Model Railroader Magazine as their motto. And it is an outstanding motto. Sometimes in the hustle and bustle of a busy NMRA life, we can forget the purpose of this organization and the reason for its existence. It is that simple phrase, "Model Railroading is fun". Although we are a not for profit educational corporation, with a multi-million dollar budget, the bottom line is that we are promoting a wonderful hobby. It is

DCC, sound, proto operations, specialty modeling, and the Internet with its vast array of sites for research, transformed the hobby. There is more specialization and interests than ever before. And the NMRA is changing with the hobby.

Well that's all for now. Those are my thoughts - what are yours?

One way for our organization to continue to make strides in the area of education is to identify 'Best Practices' at the Division and Regional levels and then to share these practices with each other. Highlights of the 2013 Board of Directors Meeting



Our "Convention Extra" NMRA eBulletin last July included a short listing of highlights from the Board meeting in Atlanta. Here are some additional highlights, but note that a much more detailed summary will appear on our website, www.nmra.org.

- NMRA Chief Financial Officer Frank Koch reported that the NMRA had received an excellent report from the 2012 Outside Audit. The organization finished 2012 with an increase in assets more than \$280,000 over the previous year.
- Stephen Priest, MMR, reported that NMRA Net developer kits are being made available. In addition, he's looking for a technical writer/columnist on DCC issues for NMRA Magazine.
- The Board discussed the current NMRA videotaping policy as it applies to convention clinics. A subcommittee has been appointed to report back with recommendations on rewriting the policy.
- The NMRA Executive Handbook, which defines how the NMRA is to operate, is currently being updated by President Charlie Getz.
- Several programs of future NMRA member benefits are being looked at by the Marketing Department, including member discounts with retailers.
- The Board awarded the 2017 NMRA convention to Orlando, FL, and heard an informal presentation from Kansas City to host the 2017 or 2018 convention.
- Progress on the NMRA's "vertical integration" was discussed. The proposed consolidation would put every U.S. Region and Division under the NMRA's 501(c)3 status and eliminate them having to file their own paperwork.

Build A Memory and National Model Railroad Month

November is National Model Railroad Month, and the NMRA is launching what we hope will become a yearly tradition.

In conjunction with Atheam Trains, Woodland Scenics and Walthers, the NMRA is unveiling *Build A Memory* at select national building and home centers. This seminar is designed to show the public how easy it is to start building a model railroad layout for themselves.

With a target date of November 16th, this year's pilot program will be a Saturday "How To" class, with Regions and selected Divisions being asked to participate in the

Here's how it will work: people interested in building a model railroad will come to the home center and watch the local Division modelers, working from a pre-distributed plan, build a small, basic layout. This construction will be augmented by a previously constructed module, giving viewers an idea of what the completed module will look like.

Those in attendance will be given a fully illustrated instruction booklet with all materials lists and lumber cut specification requirements. Representatives of local hobby shops will be there to answer any model railroad equipment questions, and local Division members can field any questions on the hobby and joining the NMRA.

The proposed areas for this year's trial are Atlanta (SER), Los Angeles (PSR), New York City (NER), Milwaukee/Chicago (MWR), Seattle-Tacoma (PNR), and Kansas City (MCoR).









